he Vice Chancellor, Prof.
Umaru A. Pate hosted a one-day
interactive session with the
renowned Investigative Journalist, Anas
Aremeyau Anas at the Entrepreneurship
and Service Learning Centre of the
University, recently.

Prof. Pate who said the purpose of the interactive session was to provide Staff and Students the opportunity to engage with the leading figure in investigative journalism, also explained that investigative journalism is not a tea party, but rather an investigative tool for uncovering hidden truth.

He further stated that, to be a journalist one must venture into Investigative Journalism

despite the time and risk involved. Adding that, people often mistake Journalism for courtesy visits and reporting of government activities, but according to him, it is a profession that goes in-depth to uncover

illegalities.

The Vice Chancellor further described Anas Aremeyau Anas as, a journalist of international repute and a fearless one. He also praised him for his exceptional work, noting that it was a rare privilege to gain from his wealth of experience, stressing that the reward of such an individual could only be the gratifying feeling of saving lives and bringing about positive changes in the society.

In his address, Anas Aremeyau Anas praised the Vice Chancellor Prof. Pate whom he described as a Mento,r and Champion of Journalism in Africa for his genuine passion and positive impact in

Journalism in the Continent as a whole.

To the students Anas said "as student journalist you are the product of your society, journalism has to be definde by you. No one can tell your story better than you". He further stated that Journalism is a serious business that requires resilience.

He emphasized that as an investigative journalist one's role is not to make arrests, but rather to expose

with 300 dollars scholarship annually.

This was revealed at the international conference on Trends in investigative journalism in northern Nigeria, organised by the North- Eastern University, Gombe, in collaboration with Wikki Times Newspaper and Tiger Eye Foundation, Ghana; on the 4th of March, 2025, in the North Eastern University premises.

Delivering a keynote address at the occasion, Vice Chancellor, Prof. Umaru A. Pate, who spoke on artificial intelligence and journalism practice, maintained that AI is an enhancer to the

world of journalism.

He explained that corruption has eaten deep into the society and it is only fair for the upcoming journalists to work hard and desist from this menace.

Prof. Pate outlined few negative effects of corruption in the society amongst which are poverty, rise in inequality between the rich and the poor, terrorism, banditry and kidnappings and sectoral corruptions. He explained that for the upcoming journalists to be successful, they have to venture into investigative reporting.

This, he described as "the form of journalism which involves uncovering matters that are concealed either deliberately by someone in a position of power or accidentally behind a chaotic mass of facts and circumstances and thereby analysing and exposing all relevant facts to the public".

Prof. Pate however recommended that to curb the menace of corruption in the society, the upcoming journalists should leverage on technology. That is, using digital tools to track financial



transactions, procurement processes, and budget allocation; and holding those in authorities accountable.

Also presenting a paper titled Radical approach to journalism, the lead speaker Mr. Anas Aremeyaw Anas, a veteran undercover journalist from Ghana, said journalism should be a product of a particular society. He Maintained that a good journalist should be able to know and identify the problem of the people. He affirmed that a journalist's role in the society cannot be downplayed, as sometimes, the efforts of the security agency could fail, while the investigative journalists can uncover the hidden story, thereby bringing the bad guys to book. Mr. Anas cautioned that, investigative reporting is not a tea- party and that the dangers are real. He urged the upcoming journalists to push on the curtains of democracy and hold the people accountable for their actions.

Barrister S. G. Idrees, explained that everybody needs to take responsibility in the society. He opined that it is better to have a bad act and law while having a good judicial system than to have a good act and law with bad practitioners. Barrister Idrees held that for a successful reportage, there is a need for a good legal team and even a security backings.

wrongdoings by reporting it to law enforcement agencies with core evidence which will be very difficult to put one into trouble.



doctors who are using already used syringe to inject patients, how some corrupt judges were hunted, bribes collection in favour of other teams in the African football, as well as the report he did in Malawi where some bad elements engaged in human organ harvest for rituals among others.

He called on the Judges to ensure fair trials allowing investigative journalist to uncover the truth.
